










Globally, nearly 1 in 10 women aged 15 and over are living in extreme poverty.







Women have suffered steeper job losses than men, along with increased unpaid care burdens at home.

In 2020, the pressures of juggling work and family, coupled with school closures and job losses in female-dominated sectors meant even fewer women were participating in the workforce.

About 113 million women aged 25–54, with partners and small children, were out of the workforce in 2020.

Women's food insecurity levels were 10% higher than men's in 2020, compared with 6% higher in 2019

In the first year of the pandemic, there were an estimated

additional unintended pregnancies in lower-and middle-income countries.

Disruptions in essential health services due to COVID-19 are taking a tragic toll on women and girls.

Response to the pandemic must include prioritizing sexual and reproductive health services, ensuring they continue to operate safely now and after the pandemic is long over.

School closures spell lost opportunities for girls and an increased risk of violence, exploitation and early marriage.

Yet less than half (42 per cent) of 131 countries and territories are taking at least one measure to support girls in returning to school.

While in transit to their new destination, 53% of migrant women report experiencing or witnessing violence, compared to 19% of men.*



By the end of 2020, 26.4 million people had fled their countries and become refugees, the highest level ever recorded.

Almost half are women and girls.


CHARTING THE WAY FORWARD

WE HAVE THE TOOLS TO ADDRESS THIS CRISIS

- Introduce economic support packages for vulnerable women and measures to confront women's increasing time and income poverty. This includes efforts to recognize, reduce and redistribute the increased burden of unpaid care and domestic work.
- ✓ Prioritize prevention and redress of violence against women and girls in COVID-19 responses and ensure that services for survivors are deemed essential and remain accessible and adequately funded.
- Close glaring gaps in social protection. In response to the pandemic, only 54 out of 195 countries and territories have introduced new or amended social protection measures targeting women and girls. Many more are needed. Longterm investments in social protection systems that reach all women and girls are key to economic recovery and future resilience.
- Eliminating inequality in the labour market is more urgent than ever, including to address occupational segregation, gender pay gaps and inadequate access to affordable childcare.
- ✓ Protect women's health and well-being, including ensuring access to sexual and reproductive health services.







2020 Study:

Understanding the Barriers to Girls' School Return in East Africa

- Interviews (FGDs and IDIs) with 382 girls
- 108 IDIs with girls who had failed to return to school post reopening
- 90% of whom pregnant






- Girls' dropout is on the rise.
